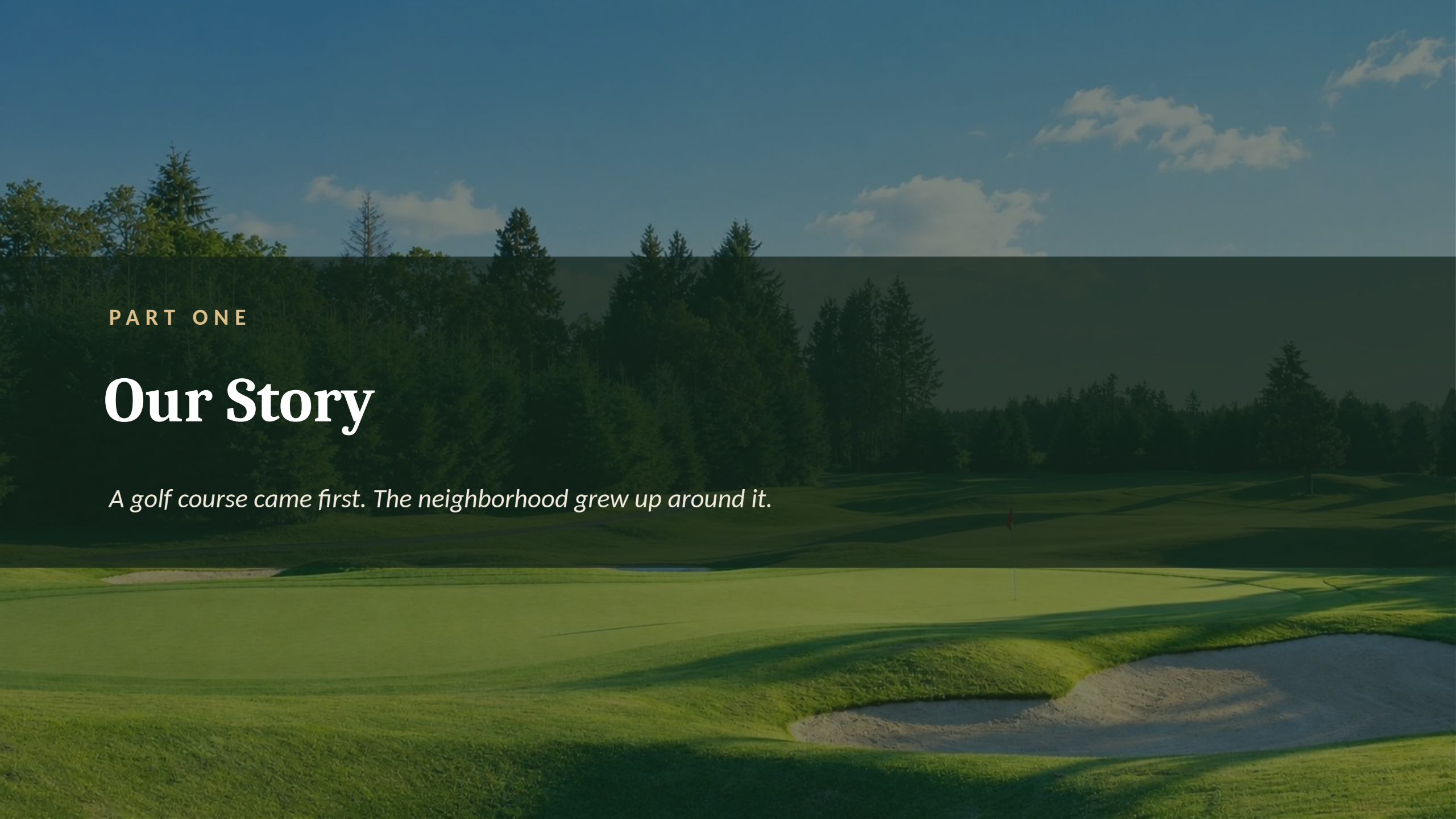

PART ONE

Our Story

A golf course came first. The neighborhood grew up around it.

HOW INDIAN SUMMER WAS FORMED

From fairways to front porches

Eight years that built the community you just moved into.

1992

The golf course opens

Indian Summer Golf & Country Club opens on Chambers Prairie — a Peter L. H. Thompson design set in old-growth forest and water.

1993

The HOA is incorporated

Indian Summer Homeowners Association is formed. Troon, Turnberry and a small portion of Prestwick are platted first.

1998

Kinsale is created

The community expands with the addition of the Kinsale neighborhood.

1999

Bellevita Townhomes begin

Our first attached-home neighborhood breaks ground.

2000

Prestwick Ln reaches Rainier Rd

Prestwick Lane is extended through to Rainier Road, opening a second gated entrance.

2000s

The Links & Chambers Park

The Links is created, and the historic Chambers homestead site becomes a community park under long-term lease.

HOW THE NEIGHBORHOOD IS LAID OUT

One community, several neighborhoods

Indian Summer wraps around the golf course. Three gated entrances — including the Rainier Road gate at Prestwick Lane — feed a network of internal neighborhoods, pocket parks and common areas.

- Troon, Turnberry & Prestwick — the original 1993 neighborhoods
- Kinsale (1998) and Kinsale Row
- Bellevita Townhomes (1999)
- The Links, Greenside Court and Fairway at 7
- Pocket parks, retention ponds and the 33-acre Nature Preserve

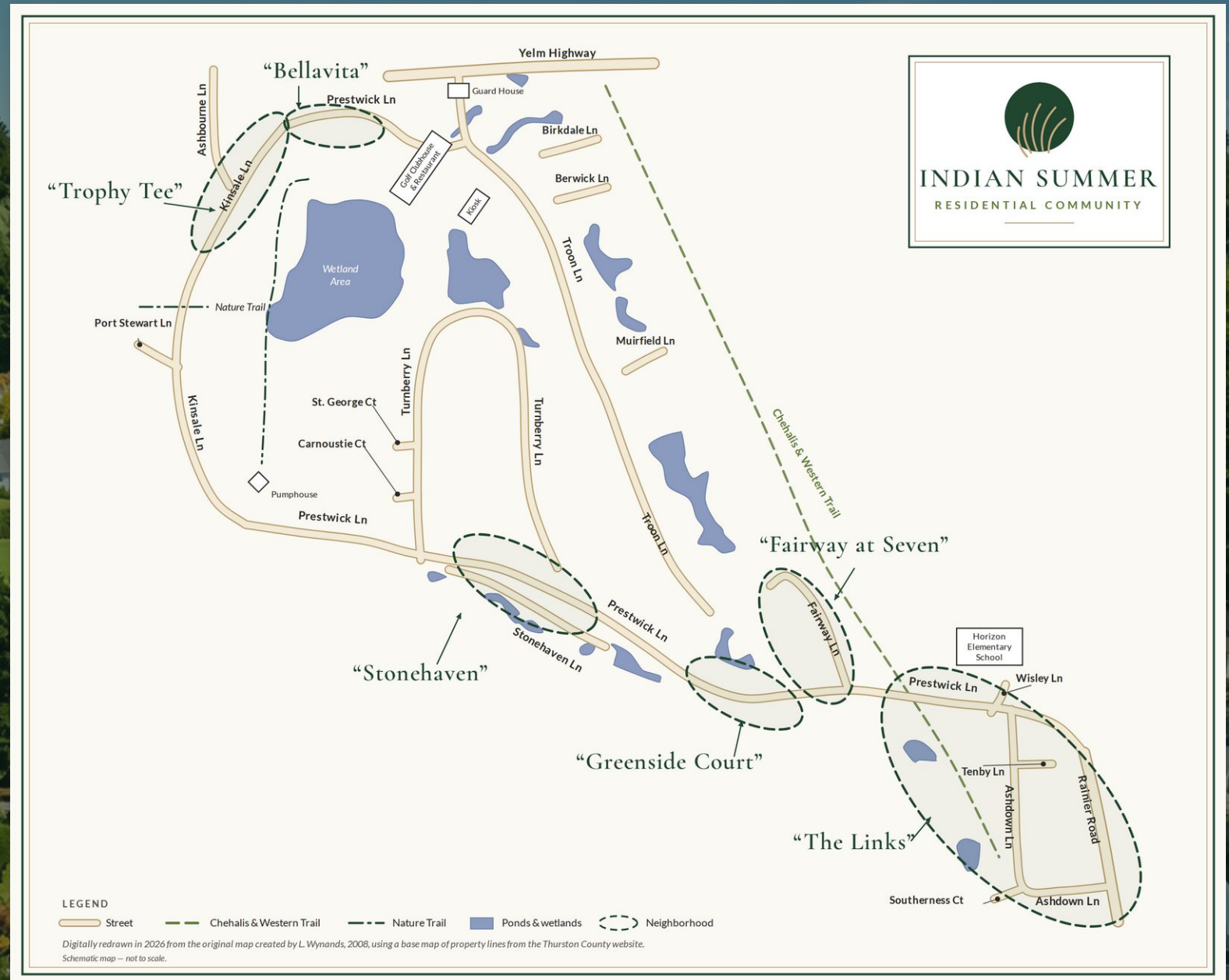
Four of these are sub-HOAs with their own boards and dues.



COMMUNITY MAP

Finding your way around

Every street, gate and neighborhood in Indian Summer, from the Yelm Highway entrance to the Rainier Road gate. The dashed outlines mark the named neighborhoods; four of them are sub-HOAs with their own boards.





RAINIER RD SE & PRESTWICK LN SE

Chambers Historical Park

A piece of Washington Territory history sits just inside our Rainier Road gate.

- In 1855, settlers on Andrew Chambers' land claim built a blockhouse here for shelter during the Washington Indian War. It sheltered about fourteen people and was abandoned within the year — no attack ever came.
- Today a historical marker and interpretive sign stand at the northwest corner of Rainier Rd SE and Prestwick Ln SE.
- ISHOA holds the site under a long-term lease with Thurston County and pays to maintain it.
- The gated lawn hosts the Pet Committee's Puppy Parties and other small community gatherings.

Also known as the Andrew Chambers Blockhouse, or Fort Chambers — one of several settler blockhouses built across Thurston County in 1855.

Our 33-acre Nature Preserve

Undeveloped forest and a seasonal pond, right inside the neighborhood.



2/3 mile

Walking trail with one side branch, maintained by volunteers



33 acres

Undeveloped forest and a large seasonal pond — home to screech owls, heron and trillium



7 nest boxes

Wood duck boxes at the pond margin, cleaned by volunteers each year

Homeowners chose more than 20 years ago to leave this tract wild. The southern trailhead and bulletin board are on Prestwick Lane.



USING THE PRESERVE

Walk it, watch it, leave it as you found it

Great blue heron, wood ducks, screech owls, trillium — all within a short walk of your door. A few simple rules keep it wild.

- Foot traffic only — no bicycles or wheeled vehicles
- No pets on the Preserve trail
- Closed after dark
- No fires or fireworks; do not damage plants or wildlife
- No trash cans on site — pack out whatever you bring in
- Wildlife concerns such as coyotes go to Thurston County

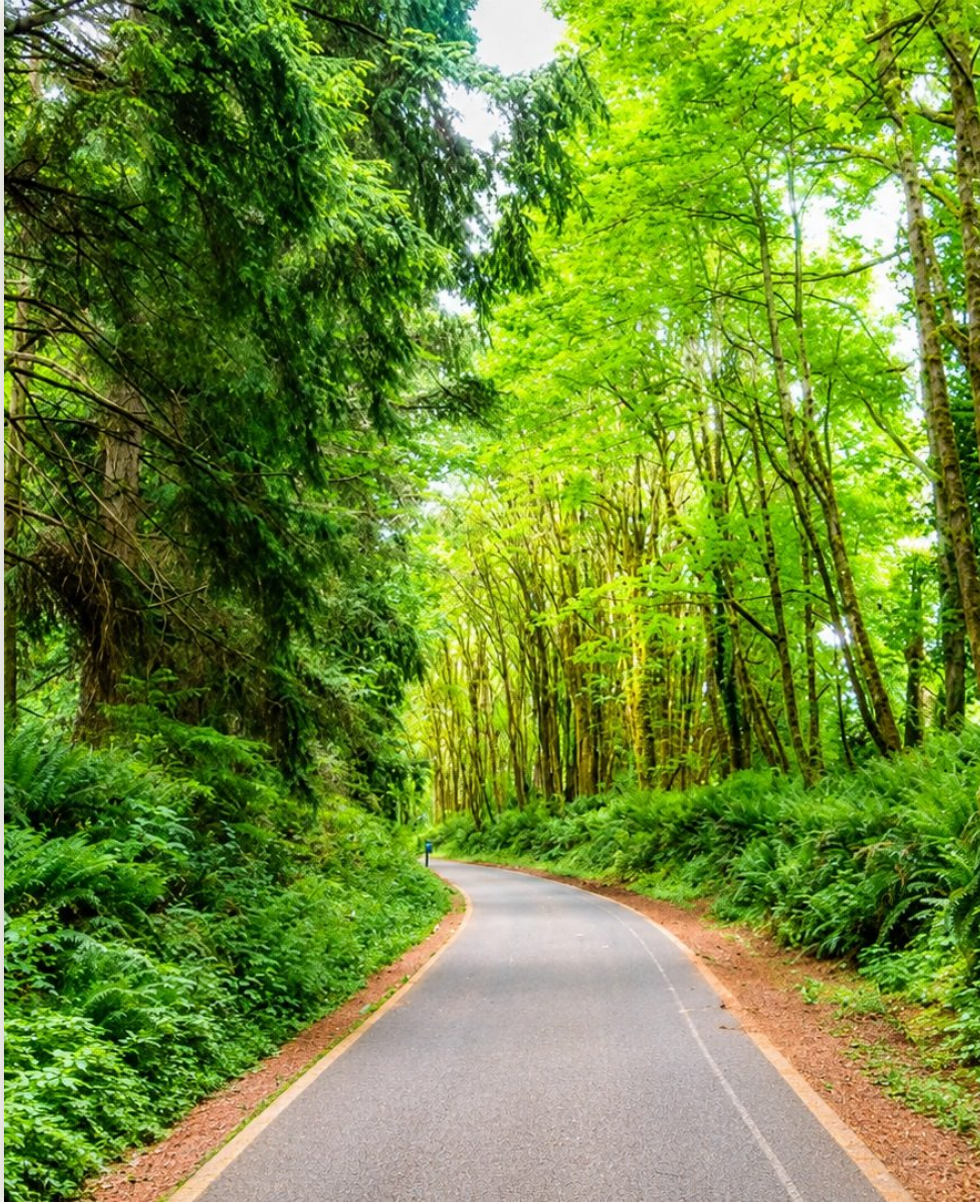
The species identification board and interpretive signs are posted at the Prestwick Lane trailhead.

NATURE PRESERVE • TRAIL MAP

Two ways onto the trail

Trail entrances are at the clubhouse and on Prestwick Lane SE, by the bulletin board. The two-thirds-mile trail winds through 33 acres of forest and past the seasonal pond — the hiker marks the Prestwick entrance.





22 PAVED MILES THROUGH THURSTON COUNTY

The Chehalis-Western Trail

A regional rail-trail runs right along our community — and you can get on it without leaving the neighborhood.

- Runs north-south from Woodard Bay on Puget Sound to Vail, and crosses the Yelm-Tenino Trail
- Access from inside Indian Summer is through the gates on Prestwick Lane, next to the Fairway at 7 Townhomes and The Links
- The large "swing" gates are for vehicles — watch for walkers and cyclists as you drive through
- Smaller "slider" gates on each side are for golf carts and pedestrians
- The keypad code is printed in your ISHOA Resident Handbook

Leashed dogs are welcome on the Trail. Trail hours are 9 a.m. to dusk.



PART THREE

Two organizations, one community

The HOA and the Golf Course are separate — and they share a fence line.

SEPARATELY, BUT TOGETHER

Who does what

Two independent organizations, one shared address.

Indian Summer HOA

A Washington non-profit corporation, incorporated in 1993 and governed by five volunteer directors elected by homeowners.

Owns and maintains the streets, sidewalks, gates, guardhouse, common areas, pocket parks, storm water systems and the Nature Preserve.

Funded by your HOA dues. Every homeowner is a member — membership is not optional.

Indian Summer Golf & Country Club

A privately operated golf club and clubhouse — a separate business with its own management, members and staff.

Owns and maintains the course, the cart paths, the ponds on the course, the Clubhouse and Embers Restaurant.

Golf membership is optional and separate from HOA dues. Embers is open to the public.

Where they meet: shared boundaries, shared views, and a shared interest in keeping Indian Summer beautiful. The CC&R Rewrite Committee is currently reviewing how the two relate in our governing documents.

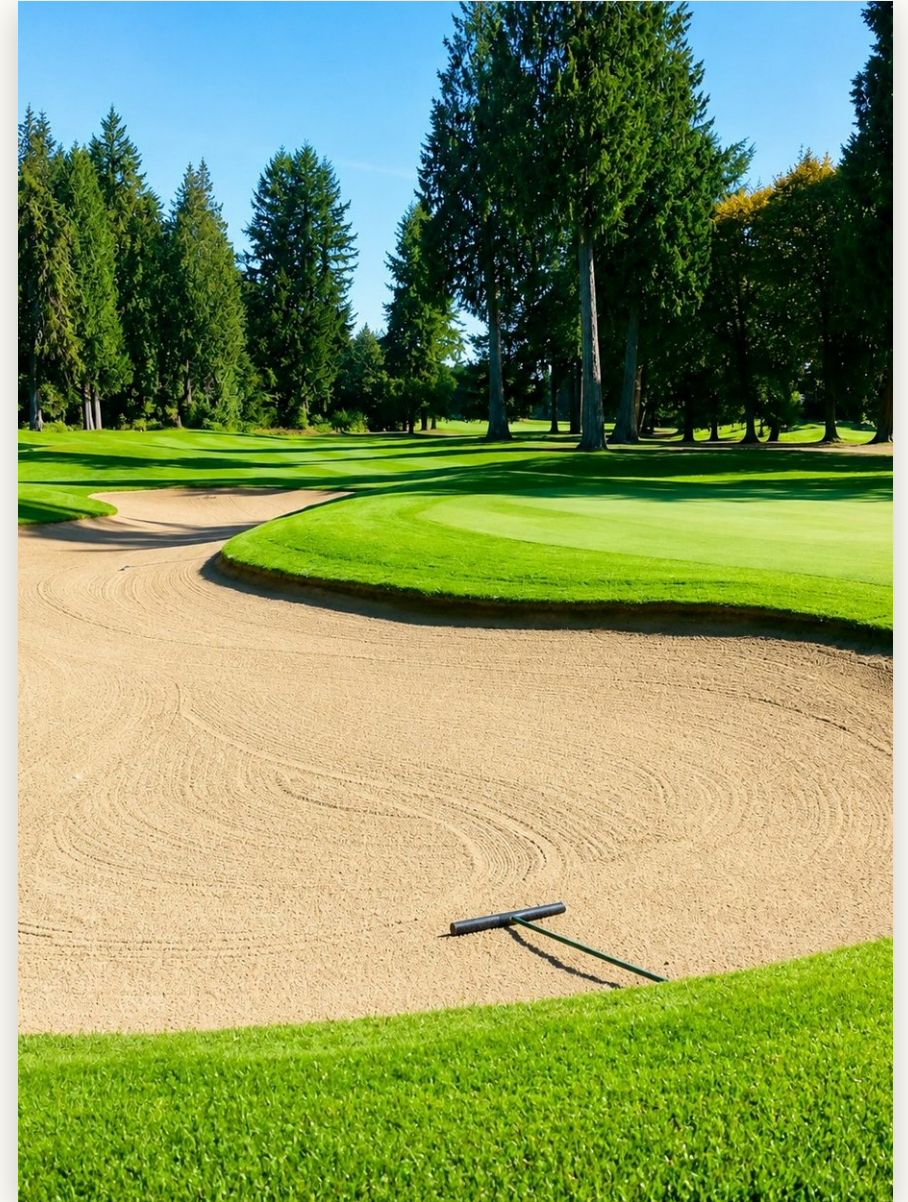
WHAT RESIDENTS SHOULD KNOW

The course is private property

Living on a fairway does not come with access to it.

- Only Golf & Country Club members who have checked in at the Pro Shop may use the course
- No dog walking, and no walking on the cart paths
- Children and pets may not play in the fairways, sand traps or ponds
- Course restrooms are for golfers who are actively playing
- Embers Restaurant in the Clubhouse is open to the public — everyone is welcome

GOVERNANCE

The documents that run Indian Summer

In order of authority — each one has to agree with the one above it.

Washington State Law

RCW 64.90, the Washington Uniform Common Interest Ownership Act, sets the legal floor for how associations like ours must operate.

Articles of Incorporation

Filed in 1993. Establishes ISHOA as a Washington non-profit corporation.

CC&Rs

Covenants, Conditions & Restrictions — amended and restated in 2009, amended again in 2014. The rules that run with your land.

Bylaws

Second Amended Bylaws (2004). How the Association elects and runs its Board.

Board & ARB Policies

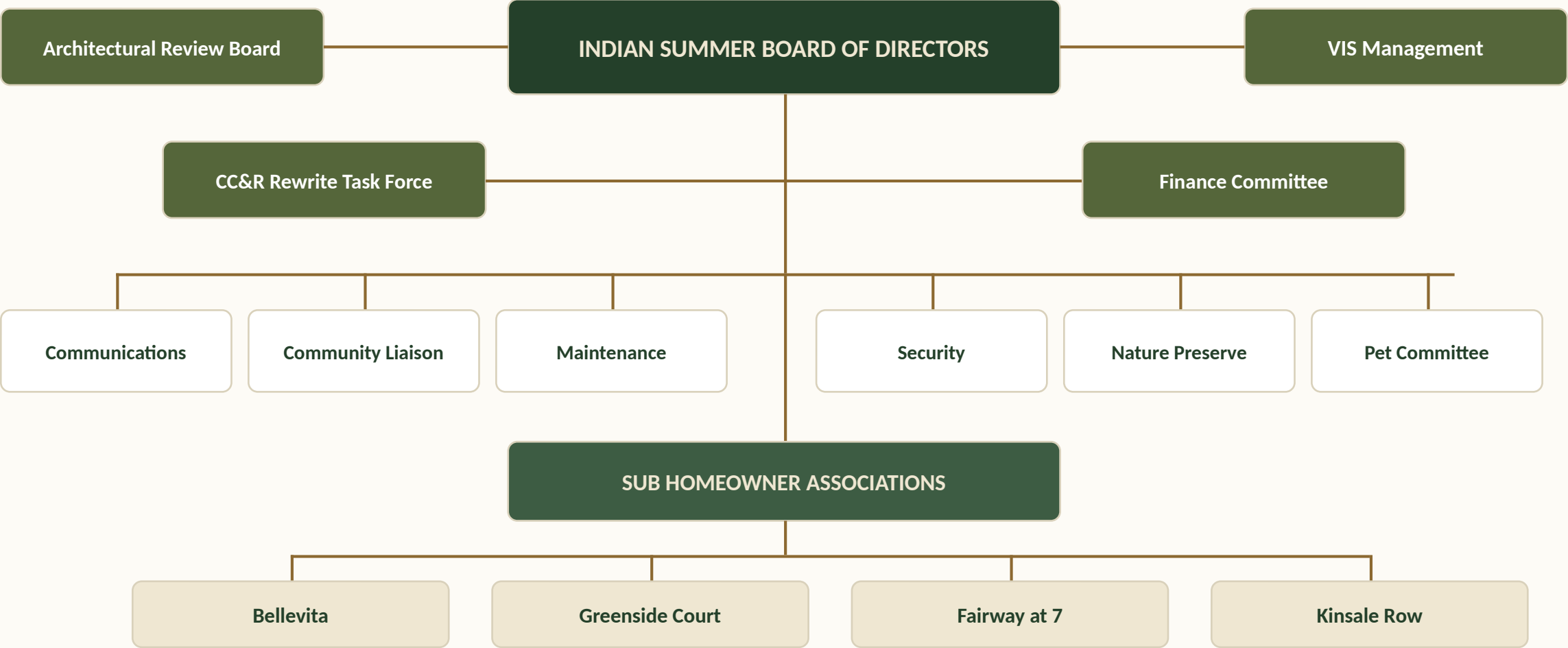
Day-to-day rules adopted by the Board, including ARB Policies 1–13 and ADM Policy 09.

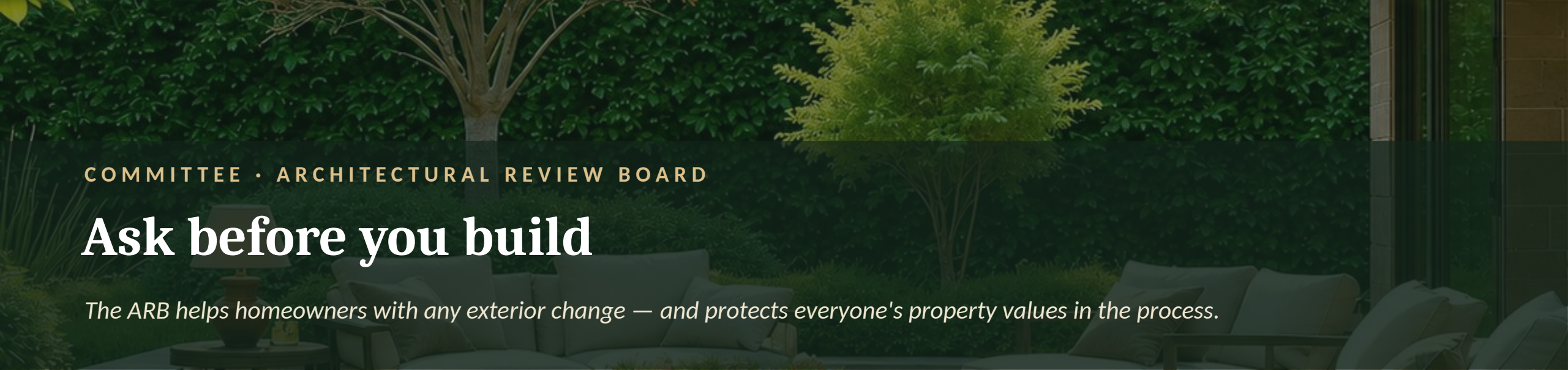

Most committees ask for an average of about two hours a week — eight hours a month. Nobody is expected to do it all.



COMMITTEE • ARCHITECTURAL REVIEW BOARD

Ask before you build

The ARB helps homeowners with any exterior change — and protects everyone's property values in the process.

Submit an ARB application before you start work on:

- Construction, remodels and re-roofing
- Solar panel installation
- Exterior painting and fencing
- Hardscape installation
- Landscaping changes — bed shape, size or ground cover
- Tree removal

Some things need no approval — for example, planting or removing annual flowers, refreshing the bark in an existing planting bed, routine pruning of trees and hedges, or removing dead shrubs. Check your ARB Policy for the exact details.

Applications are under FORMS at ishoa.org • Committee meets the 2nd Thursday of each month at 10 a.m. • Guided by CC&Rs Articles III & IV and ARB Policies 1-13.



COMMITTEE • MAINTENANCE

Keeping the common ground beautiful

Nine resident volunteers and a Board liaison — retired executives, a physician, a landscape designer, a contracts manager.

What they look after

- Landscaping and irrigation across all common areas
- Streets, sidewalks and storm water systems
- Electrical and water utilities, and mailbox installation
- Volunteers walk pocket parks and check ponds after heavy rain
- Notices go up before each quarterly street sweeping
- Contractors do the physical work — no shovel required

Gates, cameras and good habits

Indian Summer is a gated community — but not a secured one by police standards. Good neighbors are the other half of the system.

Getting in and out

- RFID tags are \$20 from VIS and open all three gates
- Gate keycards for family or hired help are \$12
- The Cellgate app opens any gate from your phone
- Visitors use the gate touchscreen to call your registered phone — press 1 to talk, then * to open

Keeping it safe

- 25 mph limit, speed humps, radar signs and speed cameras
- Close garage doors; lock cars left in the driveway
- Leave exterior lights on at night and lock your doors
- Call the guardhouse to report a solicitor, suspicious activity, a theft, or a scheduled delivery

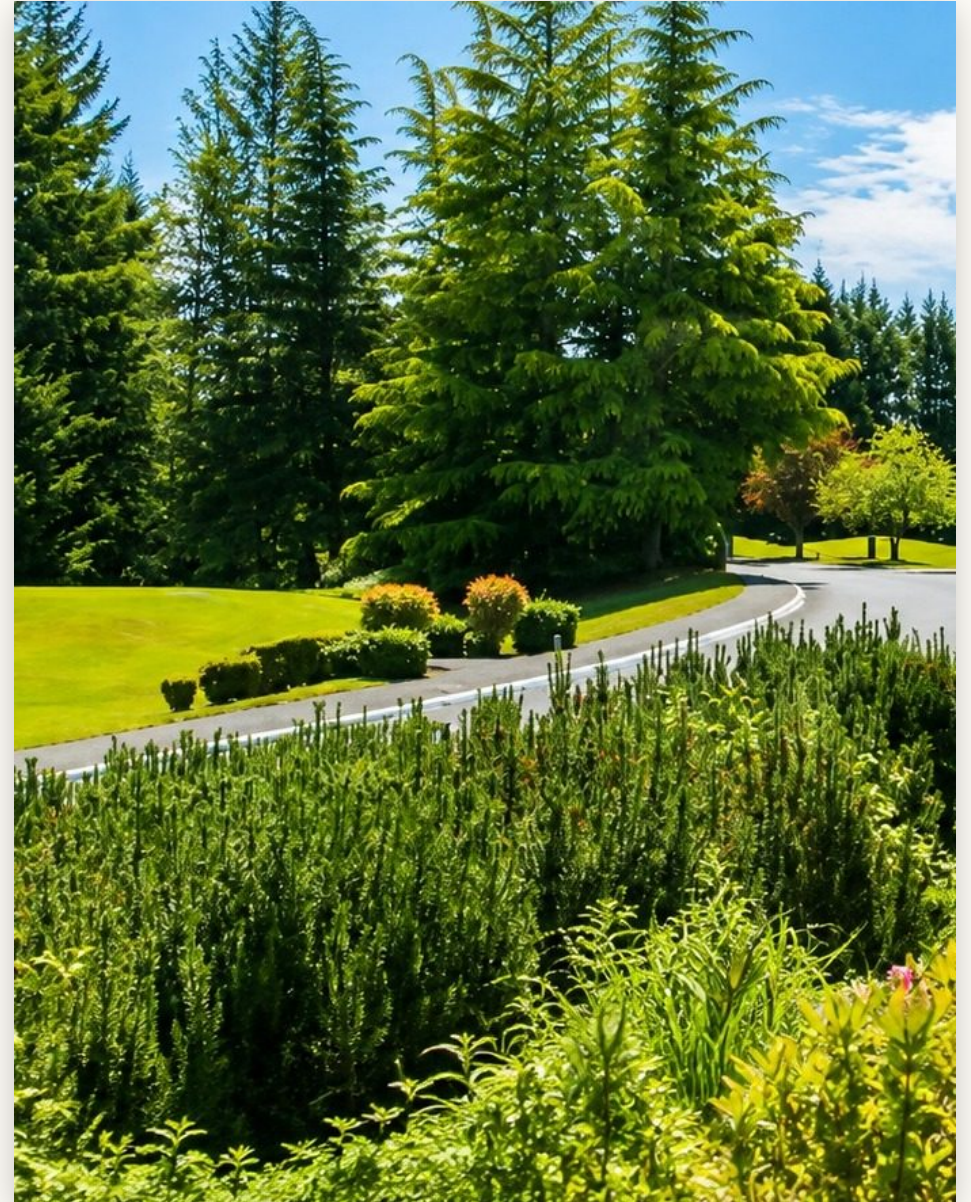
COMMITTEE • PETS

A pet-friendly neighborhood

The Pet Committee promotes good pet citizenship, organizes gatherings, and helps neighbors sort out pet concerns.

- Puppy Parties and other get-togethers at the gated Chambers Park site, just inside the Rainier Road entrance on Prestwick Ln
- Keeps a separate email list so dog owners hear about events
- Monitors and maintains the pet-waste bag dispensers throughout the community
- Meets the 1st Monday of each month at 1:30 p.m. in the Clubhouse Board Room. All residents welcome.

Leash your pet at all times • carry your own bags • dispose of waste in your own garbage • no pets on the golf course or in the Nature Preserve.

The quiet work behind your dues

Two committees that shape what Indian Summer costs and how it is governed.



Finance Committee

Advises the Treasurer and the Board on the budget, the annual audit, the Reserve Study and investment policy.

The Reserve Study is our long-range plan for replacing what we own — roads, ponds, gates — so the Association can avoid surprise special assessments.

Looking for residents with finance, accounting or budgeting experience.

CC&R Rewrite Committee

Assists the Board in amending our CC&Rs and Bylaws — to meet new federal, state and local requirements and to say things in plainer English.

Reviewing what has worked since 1993, how other communities handle the same questions, the ISHOA / Golf Course relationship and RCW 64.90.

Adoption requires an affirmative vote of 320 homeowners.

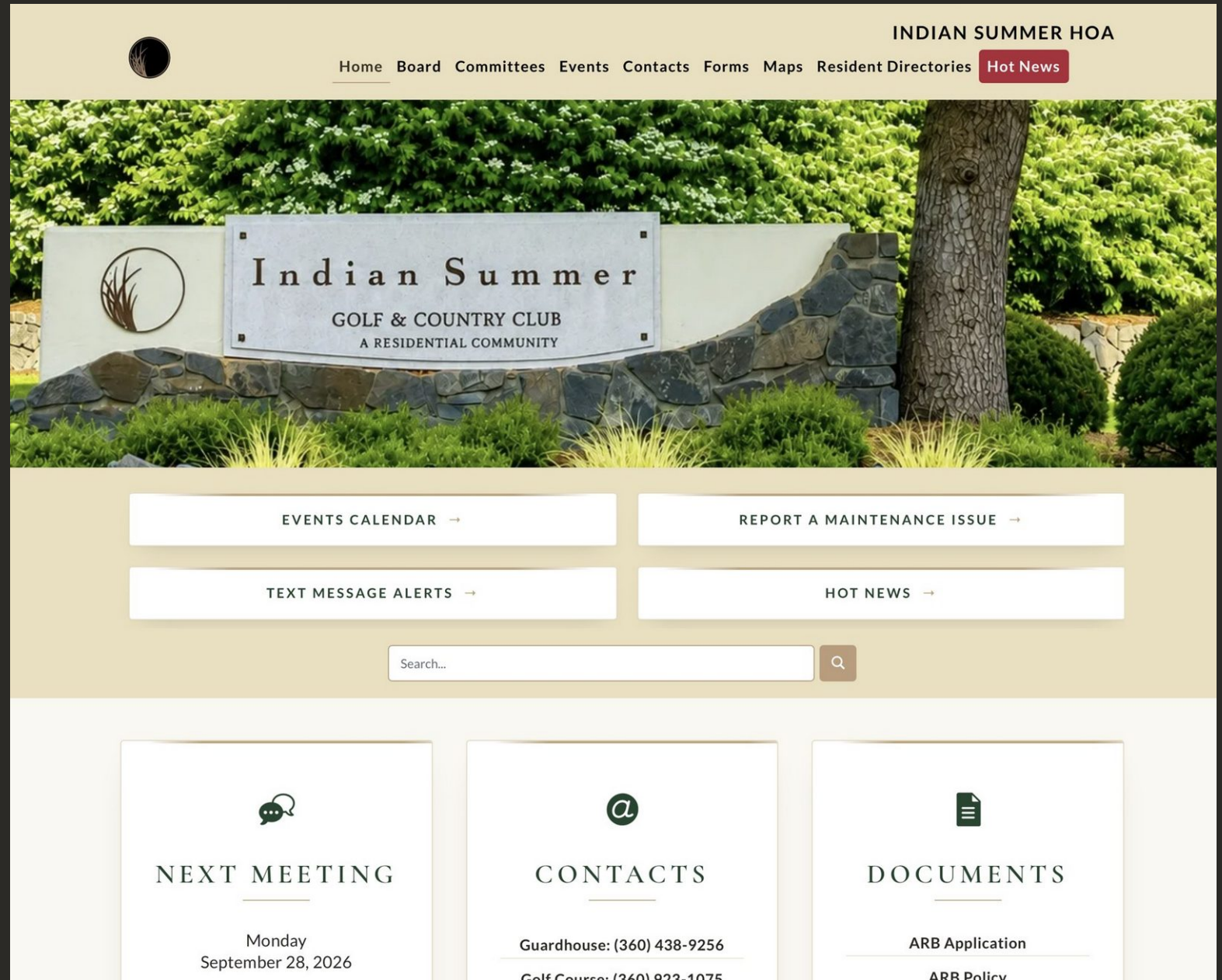
